River landing receives major upgrade

Through the combined efforts of the Friends of the Black River, town of Irving, Jackson County Highway Department and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, a popular river landing recently received a major upgrade.

The Sept. 10 renovation of the David Hansen Memorial Landing in the town of Irving included placing four yards of three- to six-inch breaker rock as the base and then topping the base with 15 yards of three-quarter inch road-base gravel.

Recycled guard-rail posts donated by JCHD were used to create four terraces leading down to the river. Two boulders were placed at the top of the slope to prevent vehicle access, which could damage the terracing.

The town provided a rubber tire loader for handling the gravel and FBR volunteers provided project coordination, chainsaw work and other labor.

In addition to individuals and small groups using the landing, various Jackson County businesses benefit from the river access.

"It's a popular put-in," said Jeff Polzin, FBR board member. "Campgrounds and canoe rental places use the landing as a drop-off site for their paddlers. It's about halfway between Black River Falls and Melrose."

The landing became a public access through a conservation easement agreement between the Mary Hansen family and West Wisconsin Land Trust. It's now monitored by Landmark Conservancy, which was formed in 2018 when WWLT merged with Bayfield Regional Conservancy.

Since being dedicated for public use in 2006, the landing has received yearly maintenance, generally provided by the town, but this is the first time it's received a significant makeover. Two benches installed at the landing also receive new tops and the picnic table is slated to be renovated and reinstalled next spring.

To reward the volunteers, Mary Hansen served the workers a picnic lunch.

FBR—Clark County Chapter News

The Clark County Chapter held its second river cleanup August 29. Chapter chair, Adam Marciniak, reported 16 volunteers came out at 8 a.m. to Listeman Park and were assigned a section of the river.

Trash removed from an illegal dumpsite was ready to be hauled away. Nearly 12 yards of the rubbish was removed with the help of an excavator and crew of volunteers.

Half the group did cleanup on land and the other eight patrolled on the water.

The effort resulted in a ten-yard dumpster getting filled about three-quarters of its capacity. The cleanup also included removing twelve yards of trash from a targeted illegal dumpsite.

Unwanted Contributions

Adam Marciniak reported finding litter in the Hill and River roads area only three days after the Clark County Chapter's August 29 cleanup.

Along with alcoholic and other beverage containers, the trash included a broken fishing pole. Adam commented, "It's not so much that I found a broken kid's fishing pole; it's the thought that some adult just taught their kid when something breaks you just throw it in the woods."
